Writing an Opinion: Letter

Step 1 Learn About Opinion Writing

What Is Opinion Writing?

An opinion tells what we like or what we would choose. In opinion writing, writers tell their opinion and give reasons to support it. Sometimes they try to convince readers to agree with them.

Opinion Writing has:

- a beginning that introduces the topic and opinion
- a middle that gives reasons
- an end that asks the reader to take action.

Danna wrote a letter to her principal, Mrs. Wadi. Her letter tells which author her class wants to be a guest speaker. Let's read it.





April 23, 2015

Dear Mrs. Wadi,

I am writing to say that Adam Bean should be our guest speaker for Author Day. Adam Bean is my favorite author. I think he would be a great guest speaker. I hope you will agree.

Adam Bean writes funny stories. In Dog Gone, Jack starts a dog-washing business. But he doesn't know that dogs hate baths! The nervous dogs race around wildly trying to escape, and Jack falls into the tub. The only one who gets a bath is Jack!

Adam Bean also gives kids like us great tips on how to write stories. He says to write what we know. So we write about school, brothers and sisters, pets, and funny things that happen. We try to make our stories just like his.

Adam Bean would be the best guest speaker. He writes funny stories and could help us to be better writers. Please invite Adam Bean to be our guest speaker on Author Day. You will not be sorry.

Every day, all day long, the boy watched the sheep. After a while, he found life in the pasture to be very dull and tiresome. One day, he thought of a way to amuse himself.


The boy ran toward the village shouting,



Step 5 Draft

This chart shows the parts of an opinion letter. Use the ideas here as you draft your **beginning**, **middle**, and **end**.



BEGINNING

States your opinion about the topic

A strong **beginning** should:

- Give your **purpose** for writing.
- State your **opinion**.



Gives reasons to support your opinion Each **middle** paragraph should:

- Give a **reason** for your opinion.
- Give **details** to support the reason.

END

Asks the reader to take action

The **end** of your letter should:

- Restate your opinion.
- Ask your reader to take action.
